# **Enrichment Week Round Up**

# Here are just some of the activities and trips that our students have enjoyed this week!

#### Culture Day - Dance and Drama-year 7

Alice in Wonderland by Lewis Carroll, published in 1865, celebrates British culture in several ways:

The story reflects the manners and social norms of Victorian England. Alice's politeness, curiosity, and emphasis on proper behaviour represent the era. Carroll's use of puns, riddles, and poems showcases the richness of British linguistic tradition and literary humour. The Mad Hatter's tea party nods to the British tradition of afternoon tea, parodying the formal tea culture of Victorian Britain.

The DANCE and DRAMA department have created a 'play in a day' based on Tim Burton's version of Alice in Wonderland and students have learnt the dance repertoire from Zoonation's "The Mad Hatter's Tea party".











#### Year 10

Year 10 students who did not have work experience placements have attended a course called 'Into University' in Great Yarmouth where they have taken part in lots of different types of activities designed to support them as they plan for the future. Here they are taking part in a team building exercise.



#### Year 8 Camp

The year 8 residential camp trip was back this year with most of the year group enjoying the full camping experience! They took part in many different activities and had experiences they will remember throughout their school days. Camp coincided with the Euro semi-final so a 'fan zone' was set up in a tent to enable students to watch the match. Well done to all of them for the way they joined in and made the most of their time there.



#### **Science and Survival**

This week Year 7 and Year 9 have been learning about Antarctica and needed to build a survival shelter that would stand up in a blizzard (a desk fan!) Mr Digby, subject leader for science told them about his experiences living in this inhospitable climate and then set them a challenge. Their challenge was that one person in the group had frostbite (and couldn't use their hands), and the rest in the group had snow-blindness (and couldn't see).



#### **Traditional Afternoon Tea**

Year 7 and 8 students enjoyed extended time in our food tech rooms working as a team to create a traditional afternoon tea. A different member of each team was responsible for each item and the results were terrific!





#### Year 8 Cinema Experience

On Tuesday, the year 8s had a cinema experience watching the Tim Burton's film 'Alice in Wonderland'. *Alice in Wonderland* is a 2010 American fantasy adventure film. The film stars many British actors such as Anne Hathaway and Helena Bonham Carter, while featuring the voices of Alan Rickman, Stephen Fry, Michael Sheen, and Timothy Spall. A live-action adaptation and re-imagining of Lewis Carroll's works, the film follows Alice Kingsleigh, a nineteen-year-old who accidentally falls down a rabbit hole, returns to Wonderland, and alongside the Mad Hatter helps restore the White Queen to her throne by fighting



against the Red Queen and her Jabberwocky, a dragon that terrorizes Wonderland's inhabitants. Pupils enjoyed eating popcorn whilst watching and discussed how the director used lighting, costume, sound and location to communicate the story in an after-show review.


#### Year 9 Battlefields Art Day

# **Online Safety advice for parents and carers**

At The National College, our WakeUpWednesday guides empower and equip parents, carers and educators with the confidence and practical skills to be able to have informed and age-appropriate conversations with children about online safety, mental health and wellbeing, and climate change. An intimate image depicts sensitive – often sexual – content, and sharing these photos or videos is commonly known as 'sexting'. As of January 2024, it is a criminal offence to distribute any intimate images shared by a third party without consent, with offenders facing prison time. Naturally, misuse of intimate images can lead to emotional distress and reputational damage.

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WARNING!

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#### **EMOTIONAL DISTRESS**

Victims of the misuse of intimate images and so-called 'sextortion' (blackmall involving sexual material) often experience significant emotional distress. The threat of having these photos or videos shared publicly can lead to anxiety, depression and a sense of helplessness. This emotional turnoil can affect daily life, academic performance and personal relationships.

#### DAMAGE TO REPUTATION

Intimate images being made public can severely damage a person's reputation. This can lead to bullying, social ostracisation and long-term impacts on personal and professional relationships. If a blackmalier gets their ha on any intimate images, the fear of reputa damage can also make a victim far more vulnerable to ongoing extortion.

#### PRIVACY VIOLATIONS

Once intimate images are shared online, it can be difficult to quickly control where they wind a and who else sees them. This loss of privacy co have lifelong repercussions, including identity the form of an exclusion begins programment.

#### FINANCIAL EXPLOITATION

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Perpetrators of sextortion may demand money from victims under the threat of releasing their intimate images publicly. This can lead to severe financial problems for victims and their families, compounding their emotional and psychological distress.

#### LEGAL CONSEQUENCES

If a child or young person creates and/or sends intimate images to others – especially adults – this is considered a form of child abuse under UK law. Having to disclose this type of abuse, although necessary, can be harrowing, leading to further trauma. It's crucial for parents, carers and educators to understand the legal processes and be able to provide proper auidance and support.

#### TRUST ISSUES

Sharing of intimate images without consent can lead to long-term trust issues. Victims may find it difficult to trust others, impacting future relationships and their ability to form healthy, supportive connections. This erosion of trust can have profound effects on mental health and social wellbeing.



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#### FOSTER A CULTURE OF OPEN COMMUNICATION

It's vital to encourage open communication with children and young people about the dangers of sharing intimate images. Create a safe space where they feel comfortable discussing their online activities and any concerns they may have without fear of judgement. Be sure to respond to any worrying information with an attitude of support and learning.

#### EDUCATE CHILDREN ON THE RISKS

Children and young people often want to understand why certain rules are in fa place. Educate them about the risks of sharing intimate images online, explaining the reasons for monitoring and other security measures. Highlight the potential for misuse, including sextortion, and the long-term consequences that can arise from these actions.



Digital literacy is incredibly important for children and young people to understand how to protect their privacy online. Teach them about secure online practices, such as using strong passwords, enabling privacy settings and recognising suspicious behaviour. This empowers them to be proactive in terms of their own safety.

#### PROVIDE SUPPORT RESOURCES

Ensure that children and young people know where to seek help if they become victims of sextortion or any other online abuse. Help them identify in advance which adults they can turn to and provide them with information about trusted resources like helplines (e.g. Childline) that they can access if they need help.
